BB Wine Tasting Group Tour Schedule (Subject to Change)

This year we will visit a selection of vineyards from the Tuskies' Wine Trail, which is divided into Clusters and some of our old favorites. BB wine tasting outings are scheduled for the 3rd Sunday of the month (subject to changes based on notification). We leave at noon sharp and we are usually done by 4:00 PM. Meet at 5314 Southport Lane if you want to carpool, or you can meet us at the vineyards. Most vineyards allow outside food, so feel free to bring snacks (we usually share!). March 15, 4–6 PM. Once again we will start out with a Bonnie Brae Wine Tasting. Bring a bottle of wine, a story about it, and a food item to go with your selection. April 18. From the Tuskie's Trail, a selection from The Loudoun Heights Cluster:

Maggie Malick Wine Caves, 12138 Harpers Ferry Rd, Purcellville, 20132.

This is a unique man-made wine cave on a 215acre estate, nestled at the foot of Short Hill Mountain, adorned with several ponds and gently rolling hills. All of the wines are estate-grown in the 20-acre vineyard, and include Bordeaux-style blends, as well as several varietals, such as Viognier, Albarino, Chardonnay, Cabernet Franc, Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot, Petit Verdot, Garnacha Tinto, and Tannat. Tasting Fee: \$8.00. Fee for groups of 8+.

Notaviva Vineyards, 13274 Sagle Road, Purcellville, VA 20132.

What is Notaviva? It is the intrinsic effect of music upon human emotion, or put simply, it is the feeling you get when you hear your favorite song. The owner's goal in the founding of the vineyard is to capture those feelings and put them in their wines. As seen on the HGTV & DIY series "Dream House," this vineyard's custom handcrafted timber frame tasting room experience is unrivaled in Virginia. Tasting Fee: \$8.00 per person (groups of 8+ \$12.00) May 17. *Linden Vineyards*, 3708 Harrels Corner Road, Linden, VA 22642

One of the favorites in Virginia, Linden Vineyards is a 4,000-case winery and vineyard situated on the Virginia Blue Ridge, 65 miles west of Washington, D.C. Jim Law, with family help, purchased what was then an abandoned hardscrabble farm in 1983. The 1985 planting was from vines mostly from cuttings and grafts propagated by the vineyard's own nursery the previous year. They included Cabernet Sauvignon, Cabernet Franc, Chardonnay, Vidal and Seyval. The first vintage was 1987 and the first release and opening of the winery was in 1988. Tasting Fee: The fee is \$7. but no charge to case club members and their guests. For those interested in greater depth, offered on the weekends is a special reserve cellar tasting (\$25.00 fee). One can register for it upon arrival. One will taste some special single-vineyard wines and older vintages. This happens every hour on the hour from 12:00 to 4:00. For the wine enthusiast, the \$25.00 tasting is well worth the money.

The group will select another vineyard after finishing at Linden, in case anyone needs to wait for the Special tasting time.

September 20. From the Tuskie's Trail, a selection from The Waterford Cluster:

Doukénie Winery, 14727 Mountain Road Purcellville, Virginia 20132

Doukénie Winery is made up of 400 acres nestled in Loudoun County, Virginia's famed "wine country," just 45 miles from Washington, DC. This wine farm provides visitors and locals an escape from reality, while increasing their knowledge of grapes and wine making. Founded in 1983, Doukénie Winery produced its first vintage in 1995 and within the last several years has received numerous prestigious awards. Doukénie Winery produces six white wines, ten red wines and a raspberry fruit wine. Because we are wine club members, we will have a reservation in the Heritage Club Room for a Private wine tastings of 45 minutes. After which time the room is available to other Heritage Club Members. Tasting is \$ 10.00

Corcoran Vineyards,14635 Corkys Farm Lane, Waterford, Va. 20197

At Corcoran Vineyards, it's now all about wine and cider. Corcoran was winery number 11 in Loudoun back in 2004 when they opened the winery to the public, having planted the vineyard in 2001. Today Loudoun has 45 wineries, and just one Cidery. Corcoran was the first Winery/Brewery in the Commonwealth and now with the first offering of Hard Cider, the winery is excited to be able to carry on the tradition that Thomas Jefferson started back in 1769 when he planted numerous varieties of apples at Monticello. Tasting Fee: \$10.00 **October 25 (note that this is the 4th Sunday).** *868 Estate Vineyard*, 14001 Harpers Ferry Rd, Purcellville, VA 20132

As we usually finish our year with a wine-themed meal, we will be dining on gourmet food from Grandale Restaurant, the vineyard's full service restaurant, which was recently named one of Northern Virginia's Top

Keeping a Watchful Eye: Bonnie Brae Neighborhood Watch

2015 marks 19 years of continuous service by our Bonnie Brae volunteers who are members of our Neighborhood Watch team. Many thanks from all of us to all of you who volunteer once a year to help keep our community safe.

Additional volunteers are always needed, and we invite you to consider this once-a-year volunteer commitment.

We use the online scheduling tool, Sign-Up Genius, so you can select the date most convenient for you (and change the date if needed). It is easy to use, and most importantly, safe and secure. You will not receive random emails from Sign-Up Genius, just one reminder a few days ahead of your commitment. Contact Nancy Davis for the link to our Bonnie Brae NHW Sign-Up Genius website.

What is involved in Bonnie Brae's Neighborhood Watch Program?

- Choose the Friday or Saturday you are able to participate just ONCE A YEAR!
- Patrol our neighborhood by car for only two hours, beginning at 10 p.m. Magnetic signs for your car identify you as our NWH volunteer
- Drive through all the streets in Bonnie Brae and both sides of Sideburn Road
- Enjoy a quiet, usually uninterrupted drive with your spouse or a friend
- Report any suspicious activity to the local police: 911 for emergencies; (703) 691-2131 for non-emergencies
- Write a brief entry into the Log Book (usually "all quiet")
- Pass the NHW supply box with magnetic car signs, flashlights, log book, etc. to the next volunteer
- Receive the gratitude of all the families who reside in Bonnie Brae

While our community is generally quiet and crime-free, occasionally we do hear about incidents that get our attention, including vandalism, damage to cars parked outside, stolen holiday decorations, or thefts from an

Fireworks Safety in Bonnie Brae

Bonnie Brae residents love to celebrate the holiday with the use of fireworks! Think 4th of July and New Year's Eve. However, be kind to your neighbors, the dogs, and the sleeping children.

Fairfax County has a Fire Prevention Code that states that any firework, which explodes, emits a flame or sparks higher than 12 feet, or performs as a projectile is prohibited. Firecrackers, cherry bombs, and skyrockets are just a few examples of fireworks which may be purchased in other areas, but are illegal here. Since even the possession of unapproved fireworks is prohibited in Fairfax County, such items will be confiscated and the person possessing them can be charged with a Class 1 misdemeanor. This carries a maximum penalty of a \$2,500 fine and/or one-year in jail.

Many people are injured each year in Fairfax County due to fireworks. Some are injured seriously and left with permanent damage. Please adhere to the following safety tips:

✗ Only use legally purchased, approved fireworks for Fairfax County.

✓ When using approved fireworks, place them on a flat surface, clear of any combustible material and clear of all buildings.

- ✗ Keep all bystanders at least 25 feet away.
- ✓ Read the directions.

✗ Do not permit young children to handle or light fireworks or sparklers.

✗ Store fireworks in a cool, dry place.

open garage. Neighborhood Watch is an effective program that contributes to preventing local crime. Because of our consistent participation in the NHW Program, Bonnie Brae has earned the respect of the Crime Prevention Section at our West Springfield District Station.

To report something or someone suspicious, call the police non-emergency number (703) 691-2131. And remember to close your garage door each night.

Bonnie Brae parking update

Under the BBCA charter, BBCA is not authorized to have any cars, trucks, or vehicles removed. ONLY Fairfax County controls the removal of cars, trucks or vehicles on our Bonnie Brae streets.

Please take care of your street. If you think that any vehicle meet the criteria below, please proceed with a request to remove the vehicle by contacting the Fairfax County Traffic Division Impound Section or the Police Department.

Inoperable Vehicles

Cars, trucks or vehicles that don't work may only be kept on a residential lot if stored in a garage or fully enclosed building. An inoperable vehicle is defined as one that:

- Does not start and move under its own power; or
- Does not display valid license plates; or
- Does not display a valid inspection decal or one that has been expired for more than 60 days.

For complaints about junk or inoperable vehicles on private property, contact the following departments:

Vehicles Blocking the Street

Parking is allowed on both sides of narrow residential streets, but vehicles must be parked close to the curb and face the proper direction of travel.

Do note, however, that it is prohibited to park in a line fire lane, within 15 feet of a fire hydrant, within 20 feet of a crosswalk and within 30 feet of a stop sign.

Update on Woodglen Lake

One Middleridge resident has been working tirelessly to ensure that adequate traffic measures are in place so the 50 to 60 dump trucks that will be entering and exiting the Zion Drive entrance to Woodglen Lake Park each day of the work phase of this long-term project do so safely. He could use all our support, since the lives of everyone using that road will be at greater risk. 2010. The county plans to dredge Woodglen in 2015 as part of a project that will enhance the lake and surrounding site to make the lake more efficient at its job – trapping sediment. The changes also will make future maintenance dredging easier.

Just as at Huntsman before work began there, a fish save

was conducted at Woodglen on November 11, 2014, to salvage as many Woodglen fish as possible. Ecologist Shannon Curtis of Fairfax County's Department of Public Works and Environmental Services (DPWES) says the vendor who provided the electrofishing service had a beautiful day to work. "More than 550 adult fish and several hundred juveniles were captured. Bluegill dominated the sample at about 90 percent, with largemouth bass, crappie, red ear sunfish, banded killifish, a few minnows and a couple bullhead catfish rounding out the numbers," Curtis said. "There were some very surprisingly large predators in this little lake/pond."

Officials took photos of a pair of hefty largemouth bass and a crappie that topped three pounds. Most of the captured fish were transported to and released into Lake Accotink in Springfield. Curtis says there may be another attempt to move more Woodglen Lake fish in the spring of 2015.

Plans also call for Lake Royal to be dredged in the

near future, but there's no time frame established. That project does not yet have a cost estimate, engineering design or a disposal site to put the spoils removed during the dredging.

It's Woodglen Lake's turn.

In 2014, Huntsman Lake was drained for engineering work performed on the dam. There was nothing wrong with the dam. The lake's emergency spillway just needed to be upgraded to meet new state regulations. Since

the water had to be drained to replace the riser as part of that project, the county took that opportunity to dredge the lakebed. Thirteen-acre Woodglen Lake in the headwaters of Pohick Creek is similar to Huntsman; however, Woodglen's emergency spillway was rehabilitated in

Meanwhile, Project Manager Matt Meyers of DPWES says the work at Huntsman Lake is complete and the water reached full pool again at 242 feet above sea level on the morning of Dec. 4, 2014. The Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries began restocking the lake in November with an initial stocking of 8,100 bluegill, 5,400 red ear sunfish and 1,400 channel catfish fingerlings.

"The completion of the Huntsman Spillway rehabilitation project marks a major milestone," Myers said. The wrap-up of work at Huntsman means that all five county lake dams that fall under the state law that regulates the maintenance and operation of those facilities now meet current dam safety requirements.

Woodglen project partners are Fairfax County and the Northern Virginia Soil and Water Conservation District. For more information about the project, contact the county's Braddock District Office at 703-425-9300, TTY 711.
